Public Safety in South Park

In 2020, South Park received a new Public Safety Coordinator dedicated to bringing connection, engagment, and safety among youth, residents, businesses, and organizations.

The community members of the South Park neighborhood approached the Seattle Neighborhood Group with the idea of creating more community-led initiatives to connect people in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic.

To connect neighbors and residents around safety, we collaborated with community organizations such as the Duwamish Valley Youth Corps, Safe Streets, and Seattle Department of Transportation (SDOT), coordinating monthly cleanups, skatepark renovation and construction, safety initiatives, crime prevention training, and youth programs.

















We formed a partnership between South Park Arts and Urban ArtWorks to fund multiple youth-centered community-building programs, including teaching a youth writing circle, organizing Skate Like A Girl at the River City Skatepark, sharing crime-prevention tips, volunteer events, and assisting with a newsletter in multiple languages. South Park Public Safety Coordinator, Dennis Diaz, connected with residents by knocking on doors to inform families about social services as the public safety coordinator.

We also partnered with multiple food relief programs in South Park to bring community food pantries, hygiene products, and cleaning supplies.

Rainier Beach: A Beautiful Safe Place for Youth



Since 2013, Seattle Neighborhood Group has provided coordination support for Rainier Beach: A Beautiful Safe Place for Youth (ABSPY), a community-led, place-based initiative that uses evidence-informed and supports the implementation of non-arrest interventions to address violence against youth in highly concentrated Rainier Beach neighborhoods.

In 2020, Rainier Beach gained much attention across Seattle for the many initiatives put into place for community safety. Through using Place-Based Intervention, Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED), Business Engagement, and Campus Safety Team, we collaborated and



partnered with other organizations to provide recommendations for physical improvements to public spaces, providing a sense of community ownership to occupied spaces.

Seattle Neighborhood Group provides overall coordination and support to the initiative's Core Team, Intervention Team, and Community Task Force. Our mission in Rainier Beach and every community is to prevent crime and build community partnerships with residents, businesses, law enforcement, and other organizations. ABSPY's Core Team includes representatives from the City of Seattle, the Seattle Police Department, the Boys and Girls Club of King County Seattle, Seattle Public Schools, and Rainier Beach Action Coalition.

We use an innovative, community-led approach to reduce violence that affects youth in the Rainier Beach neighborhood of Seattle, Washington.



We identify and address the place-based causes of youth victimization and crime at five focus locations, known as "hotspots" in the Rainier Beach neighborhood.

Our new Project Manager for Rainier Beach: A Beautiful Safe Place for Youth, Cathie Wilmore, provided support to the families in the community in coordinating many food deliveries, registering elders and seniors to receive the COVID-19 vaccine, and coordinating outreach programs in the community. Using CPTED, ABSPY has provided and initiated changes occurring in Rainier Beach, including community engagement, weekly community healing, activation spaces, and youth involvement.

East African Community Outreach & Crime Prevention



With the coronavirus pandemic leaving many BIPOC communities vulnerable in 2020, our East & Southeast African Program Coordinator, Michael, partnered with Horn of Africa Services, Yesler Community Center, Tilth Alliance, and Rainier Beach Urban Farm & Wetlands to connect and engage with at-risk populations.

Throughout the pandemic, East African seniors, refugees, and immigrants were supported in receiving culturally appropriate food, hygiene supplies, and a safe place for community events and programming in Northgate, Yesler, and at the Rainier Beach Urban Farm & Wetlands each week. With COVID-19 isolating many seniors and families and community centers closed, the Seattle Neighborhood Group organized and collaborated on opportunities to support many people affected by the pandemic.

The senior program continues to grow and connect with communities for receiving supplies, socialization, and services.



IMPACT! Safe Schools

IMPACT! Safe Schools had a new look for exploring mental health awareness and suicide prevention during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Seattle Neighborhood Group partnered with Seattle University, Seattle Police Department, and National Alliance on Mental Illness Seattle (NAMI) to present high school students IMPACT! Safe Schools by bringing the conference into an online space.

Students were able to experience IMPACT! in a remote way by participating in three separate presentations focused on Mental Health Awareness. NAMI started the conference with an End the Silence presentation designed to teach the signs and symptoms of mental illness and recognize the early warning signs. NAMI's Ending the Silence also included a Young Adult sharing their recovery journey with a mental health condition. Afterward, IMPACT! Students joined discussion breakout rooms with Seattle University college students as facilitators navigating youth responses.

We partnered with Skyline High School students featured in The Seattle Times for their collaborative state-wide mental health survey, gathering hundreds of students' responses, we collaborated on a second presentation for students to engage in. They shared their process of becoming advocates for their own change in schools and bringing student voices to light in Washington state surrounding COVID-19 and remote learning.

Our extraordinary Keynote Speaker, Clinical psychologist Dr. Laura Kastner of the University of Washington, brought her credible background and knowledge of mental health. Students learned in-depth how mental health affects the brain in youth and young adults. Students participated in a Question-Answer-led discussion with Dr. Kastner on understanding and acknowledging warning signs. We couldn't have done it without the many youth-led voices and opinions surrounding mental health awareness during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Response to COVID-19

During the COVID-19 outbreak, our communities have been deeply affected through job loss, low access to health information, increased stress at home during quarantine, food insecurity, lack of hygiene supplies, and as targets for fraud. Neighborhoods have experienced a decrease in service while the city reduced maintenance schedules.

In response to these issues, Seattle Neighborhood Group shifted its focus to keeping communities safe, informed, and connected to resources throughout the many neighborhoods we serve.

We supported communities in different aspects, including:

- 1. Establishing stronger partnerships with organizations to create and share resources for food insecurity, hygiene supplies, target fraud, and crime-prevention assessments.
- 2. Partnering with Seattle Tilth and Rainier Beach Urban Farm and Wetlands, we provided culturally appropriate groceries to East and Southeast African refugee and immigrant communities in Seattle, including North, Central, and South Seattle.
- 3. Connecting with the vulnerable and at-risk elderly within the South Seattle area to address food insecurities and connect seniors to resources like food banks.
- 4. Supporting communities by connecting residents with outreach, coordinating, scheduling, receiving, and transporting to vaccination sites.
- 5. Engaging with senior community residents in engaging in letter- writing campaigns to create and maintain social engagement while socially distancing.
